

Politics of Regionalism in Jammu and Kashmir Historical Evolution, Constitutional Transformation, and Democratic Governance

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Abstract—Regionalism has been a central force shaping the political, constitutional, and governance landscape of Jammu and Kashmir. Rooted in the region's historical evolution, geographical diversity, and socio-cultural plurality, it has influenced political representation, Centre–State relations, and regional aspirations across Jammu, Kashmir, and Ladakh. This paper examines the historical development of regionalism from the Dogra period to the post-independence era and analyses its transformation following the abrogation of Article 370 and the enactment of the Jammu and Kashmir Reorganisation Act, 2019. It explores the implications of these constitutional changes for democratic governance, regional identity, political participation, and institutional restructuring. Using a qualitative and analytical approach based on constitutional provisions, historical records, government reports, and secondary literature, the study evaluates the changing dynamics of governance and regional politics. The paper argues that while the constitutional transformation seeks to strengthen national integration, administrative efficiency, and development, it has also intensified debates on federalism, autonomy, representation, and democratic legitimacy. It concludes that sustainable peace and effective democratic governance in Jammu and Kashmir require balanced regional development, inclusive political participation, institutional accountability, and continued engagement with the diverse aspirations of all regions within India's constitutional framework.

I. INTRODUCTION

Regionalism is a significant feature of India's federal polity, reflecting the diverse historical, cultural, linguistic, and socio-economic identities that coexist within the Union. While regional aspirations have often contributed to democratic participation and decentralization, they have also generated complex political challenges relating to identity, representation, resource distribution,

and Centre–State relations. Among all Indian regions, Jammu and Kashmir presents one of the most distinctive and contested cases of regionalism due to its unique historical evolution, constitutional status, strategic geopolitical location, and socio-cultural diversity.

The erstwhile State of Jammu and Kashmir comprised three distinct regions—Jammu, Kashmir, and Ladakh—each possessing its own historical experiences, demographic composition, linguistic traditions, religious identities, and political aspirations. These regional differences have significantly influenced electoral politics, governance structures, developmental priorities, and demands for autonomy and representation. The politics of regionalism in Jammu and Kashmir has therefore evolved not merely as an expression of cultural identity but also as a response to perceived political exclusion, regional imbalances, administrative disparities, and changing constitutional arrangements.

Historically, the foundations of regionalism can be traced to the Dogra rule (1846–1947), during which the princely state was administratively unified despite its diverse regional identities. Following the accession of Jammu and Kashmir to India in 1947, the region acquired a distinctive constitutional position through Article 370 of the Constitution of India, granting it a special status within the Indian Union. Over subsequent decades, the relationship between the Union Government and the State underwent continuous transformation through constitutional orders, political negotiations, judicial interventions, and administrative reforms. These developments shaped competing narratives of autonomy, integration, federalism, and democratic governance across the three regions.

A major constitutional turning point occurred on 5 August 2019, when Article 370 was effectively rendered inoperative and the Jammu and Kashmir Reorganisation Act, 2019, reorganized the erstwhile State into the Union Territories of Jammu and Kashmir and Ladakh. These changes fundamentally altered the constitutional and administrative framework of the region and initiated a new phase in its political evolution. The reorganization has generated extensive scholarly and policy debates concerning federalism, democratic legitimacy, regional representation, institutional restructuring, development, security, and the future trajectory of Centre–Union Territory relations. Regionalism in the post-2019 context continues to influence political discourse through issues such as delimitation of constituencies, restoration of statehood, grassroots democratic institutions, equitable regional development, and the protection of regional identities. The interaction between constitutional transformation and regional aspirations has become central to understanding the evolving nature of democratic governance in Jammu and Kashmir.

Against this backdrop, the present study examines the politics of regionalism in Jammu and Kashmir by analysing its historical evolution, the constitutional transformations that have reshaped its governance framework, and their implications for democratic institutions and regional politics. The study adopts a qualitative and analytical approach based on constitutional provisions, historical records, government reports, judicial decisions, and scholarly literature. It seeks to evaluate how regional identities, constitutional reforms, and governance structures interact in shaping political participation, representation, and democratic accountability. By providing a comprehensive analysis of these interrelated dimensions, the paper contributes to a deeper

understanding of regionalism within the broader framework of Indian federalism and democratic governance.

IV. LITERATURE REVIEW

The politics of regionalism in Jammu and Kashmir has attracted significant scholarly attention owing to the region's complex historical evolution, constitutional distinctiveness, and strategic importance. Existing literature examines the interplay of regional identities, federalism, constitutional developments, governance, and conflict. However, the constitutional transformation of 2019 has created new dimensions that require further academic inquiry.

One of the earliest comprehensive accounts of the political history of Jammu and Kashmir is provided by Prem Nath Bazaz (1954) in **The History of Struggle for Freedom in Kashmir**. Bazaz traces the emergence of political consciousness during the Dogra regime and explains how socio-

economic inequalities and political exclusion contributed to regional discontent. His work highlights the historical roots of regional politics but pays limited attention to contemporary governance and constitutional developments.

Balraj Puri (2008), in **Kashmir: Towards Insurgency** and **Jammu and Kashmir: Triumph and Tragedy of Indian Federalism**, offers one of the most balanced analyses of regional diversity within the erstwhile state. Puri argues that Jammu, Kashmir, and Ladakh possess distinct political aspirations and that the failure to accommodate these differences contributed to recurring political instability. He advocates decentralization, regional autonomy, and democratic dialogue as essential mechanisms for sustaining peace and federal harmony.

Sumantra Bose (2003), in **Kashmir: Roots of Conflict, Paths to Peace**, examines the historical, political, and international dimensions of the Kashmir conflict. Bose contends that democratic deficits, contested political legitimacy, and inadequate political representation have deepened regional alienation. While his work provides valuable insights into conflict resolution, it predates the constitutional changes of 2019 and therefore does not address the altered constitutional framework.

Similarly, A. G. Noorani (2011), in **Article 370: A Constitutional History of Jammu and Kashmir**, provides an exhaustive constitutional analysis of Article 370 and Centre–State relations. Noorani argues that the gradual erosion of the state's constitutional autonomy significantly influenced political developments in Jammu and Kashmir. His work remains an important reference for understanding the constitutional evolution of the region, although it naturally does not examine the post-2019 legal order.

Christopher Snedden (2015) explores the historical evolution of the Kashmir dispute in **Understanding Kashmir and Kashmiris**. He emphasizes the multiplicity of identities within Jammu and Kashmir and argues that regional aspirations differ substantially across Jammu, Kashmir, and Ladakh. His work contributes to understanding regional diversity but focuses primarily on the conflict dimension rather than democratic governance.

Scholars of Indian federalism, including Granville Austin (1999) and M. P. Jain (2018), provide valuable theoretical perspectives on constitutional governance, federalism, and Centre–State relations. Their analyses help explain the broader constitutional context within which the political transformation of Jammu and Kashmir can be understood. However, these works are not exclusively devoted to regional politics in Jammu and Kashmir.

Following the constitutional changes of August 2019, scholarly debate has increasingly focused on the implications of the abrogation of Article 370 and the Jammu and Kashmir Reorganisation Act, 2019. Recent studies examine questions relating to constitutional validity, democratic governance, security, development, political representation, delimitation, and the restoration of statehood. While some scholars argue that the constitutional transformation promotes national integration, administrative efficiency, and uniform application of laws, others contend that it raises concerns regarding federalism, democratic participation, regional autonomy, and constitutional morality. The emerging literature demonstrates that the long-term consequences of these reforms remain an evolving area of academic inquiry.

Research on democratic governance in the post-2019 period has also examined the functioning of Panchayati Raj Institutions, District Development Councils (DDCs), and grassroots democratic processes. These studies indicate that decentralization has expanded opportunities for local participation while simultaneously highlighting challenges related to political legitimacy, institutional capacity, and public trust.

Despite the substantial body of literature on Jammu and Kashmir, several research gaps remain. First, most historical studies focus either on the Kashmir conflict or on constitutional autonomy without comprehensively integrating the perspectives of Jammu, Kashmir, and Ladakh. Second, much of the pre-2019 scholarship cannot adequately explain the transformed constitutional and administrative framework established after the reorganization of the erstwhile state. Third, there is limited research examining the interrelationship between historical regionalism, constitutional transformation, and democratic governance within a single analytical framework. Finally, comparatively fewer studies evaluate how contemporary governance institutions interact with evolving regional aspirations in the post-2019 context.

The present study seeks to address these gaps by adopting an integrated approach to the politics of regionalism in Jammu and Kashmir. It examines the historical evolution of regionalism, analyzes the constitutional transformation brought about by the Jammu and Kashmir Reorganisation Act, 2019, and evaluates its implications for democratic governance, political representation, and regional inclusion. By linking historical, constitutional, and governance perspectives, the study contributes to a more comprehensive understanding of the changing political landscape of Jammu and Kashmir within the broader framework of Indian federalism.

V. RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

The present study adopts a **qualitative and descriptive-analytical research design** to examine the politics of regionalism in Jammu and Kashmir. The analysis of the politics of regionalism in Jammu and Kashmir reveals that regionalism is a multidimensional phenomenon shaped by historical legacies, constitutional arrangements, socio-cultural diversity, and evolving political institutions. The findings of the study are presented under the following thematic areas:

1. Historical Legacy as the Foundation of Regionalism

The study finds that regionalism in Jammu and Kashmir has deep historical roots dating back to the Dogra rule (1846–1947). The political integration of geographically and culturally distinct regions—Jammu, Kashmir, and Ladakh—under a single princely state created enduring regional disparities in administration, political participation, and economic development. These historical experiences contributed to the emergence of distinct regional identities that continue to influence contemporary politics.

2. Regional Diversity Shapes Political Behaviour

The analysis indicates that the three regions of the erstwhile state exhibit distinct political aspirations and electoral preferences. While the Kashmir Valley has historically emphasized autonomy, identity, and constitutional safeguards, the Jammu region has largely supported greater political integration with the Union of India and equitable representation. Ladakh has consistently advocated administrative autonomy, culminating in its recognition as a separate Union Territory in 2019. These divergent aspirations demonstrate that regionalism in Jammu and Kashmir cannot be understood as a homogeneous political phenomenon.

3. Constitutional Transformation Restructured the Governance Framework

The constitutional changes of August 2019 significantly altered the political and administrative structure of Jammu and Kashmir. The abrogation of Article 370 and the enactment of the Jammu and Kashmir Reorganisation Act, 2019, resulted in the reorganization of the erstwhile State into two Union Territories. The study finds that this transformation expanded the applicability of central laws, redefined Centre–Union Territory relations, and introduced a new administrative framework aimed at strengthening governance and institutional integration.

4. Democratic Governance Has Expanded at the Grassroots Level

The establishment and strengthening of Panchayati Raj Institutions and District Development Councils have contributed to greater decentralization and local political participation. These institutions have created opportunities for grassroots representation, local planning, and community engagement. However, the effectiveness of democratic governance continues to depend on administrative capacity, financial autonomy, and sustained political participation.

5. Regional Imbalances Continue to Influence Political Discourse

Despite constitutional restructuring, concerns regarding equitable distribution of resources, employment opportunities, infrastructure development, and political representation remain significant across different regions. The analysis suggests that perceptions of regional imbalance continue to shape electoral politics and public policy debates. Balanced regional development remains essential for strengthening democratic legitimacy and social cohesion.

6. Federalism Has Entered a New Phase

The study finds that the constitutional transformation has redefined the nature of Indian federalism in relation to Jammu and Kashmir. While the reforms have enhanced constitutional integration and administrative uniformity, they have also generated debates regarding the balance between national integration, regional autonomy, democratic participation, and cooperative federalism. The evolving constitutional relationship between the Union Government and the Union Territory remains central to contemporary political discourse.

7. Democratic Legitimacy Depends on Inclusive Political Processes

The analysis indicates that effective democratic governance requires not only institutional reforms but also inclusive political participation and public confidence in democratic institutions. Issues relating to political representation, restoration of statehood, electoral participation, and institutional accountability continue to influence democratic legitimacy in the region. Strengthening participatory governance remains essential for addressing regional aspirations.

8. Regionalism Has Shifted from Identity Politics to Governance Concerns

The study reveals that although identity continues to influence regional politics, contemporary political discourse increasingly emphasizes governance-related issues such as development, employment, infrastructure, public service delivery, transparency, and decentralization. This shift suggests that democratic governance and socio-economic development have become important dimensions of regional political aspirations.

9. Need for Balanced and Inclusive Governance

The findings indicate that sustainable peace and democratic stability depend upon governance models that accommodate the diverse aspirations of Jammu, Kashmir, and Ladakh through inclusive decision-making, equitable development, and effective decentralization. Policies promoting regional equity, institutional transparency, and participatory governance are likely to reduce political alienation and strengthen democratic institutions.

XIV. OVERALL FINDINGS

The study concludes that regionalism in Jammu and Kashmir is neither inherently divisive nor incompatible with national integration. Rather, it reflects the legitimate socio-political aspirations of historically distinct regions within a democratic framework. The constitutional transformation of 2019 has fundamentally altered the institutional landscape by strengthening constitutional integration and administrative restructuring. However, its long-term success depends on responsive governance, restoration and consolidation of democratic institutions, balanced regional development, and continued dialogue among stakeholders. Addressing regional disparities while upholding constitutional values and democratic principles will remain crucial for achieving political stability, social cohesion, and sustainable development in Jammu and Kashmir.

XV. POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS

Based on the findings of the study, the following policy recommendations are proposed to strengthen democratic governance, promote balanced regional development, and address the diverse aspirations of the people of Jammu and Kashmir:

1. Promote Inclusive and Participatory Governance

Governance should be based on inclusive political participation by ensuring adequate representation of all regions, communities, women, youth, and marginalized groups in decision-making processes. Strengthening democratic institutions through regular elections and greater citizen engagement will enhance public trust and political legitimacy.

2. Restore and Strengthen Democratic Institutions

The timely conduct of elections, continued empowerment of elected local bodies, and restoration of representative democratic institutions are essential for ensuring political accountability and responsive governance. Strengthening the role of Panchayati Raj Institutions, Urban Local Bodies, and District Development Councils through greater financial and administrative autonomy can improve grassroots democracy.

3. Ensure Balanced Regional Development

Development policies should focus on reducing regional disparities by adopting an equitable allocation of resources among Jammu, Kashmir, and Ladakh (where relevant in historical and comparative analysis). Priority should be given to infrastructure development, healthcare, education, employment generation, tourism, agriculture, and digital connectivity in underserved and border areas.

4. Strengthen Cooperative Federalism

Constructive engagement between the Union Government and regional stakeholders should be institutionalized to address constitutional, administrative, and developmental concerns. A cooperative and consultative approach can strengthen democratic governance while accommodating legitimate regional aspirations within the constitutional framework of India.

5. Enhance Transparency and Good Governance

Administrative reforms should emphasize transparency, accountability, efficiency, and citizen-centric service delivery. The use of e-governance, digital public services, social audits, grievance redressal mechanisms, and performance-based monitoring can improve institutional effectiveness and public confidence.

6. Promote Social Cohesion and Regional Integration

Government initiatives should encourage inter-regional dialogue, cultural exchange, educational collaboration, and community participation to strengthen mutual understanding among the diverse populations of Jammu, Kashmir, and Ladakh. Such measures can reduce regional mistrust and promote national integration while respecting cultural diversity.

7. Encourage Evidence-Based Policy Formulation

Policy decisions relating to regional development, governance, and institutional reforms should be based on empirical research, socio-economic indicators, and periodic impact assessments.

Collaboration among academic institutions, policy think tanks, civil society organizations, and government agencies can facilitate informed decision-making.

8. Strengthen Human Resource and Institutional Capacity

Capacity-building programmes for civil servants, elected representatives, and local governance institutions should be expanded to improve policy implementation, public administration, and citizen participation. Training in digital governance, financial management, and participatory planning can enhance administrative efficiency.

XVI. CONCLUSION

The politics of regionalism in Jammu and Kashmir represents a complex interaction of history, identity, constitutional evolution, and democratic governance. The region's diverse socio-cultural composition and distinct historical experiences have shaped varying political aspirations across Jammu, Kashmir, and Ladakh, making regionalism a defining feature of its political landscape. Rather than being viewed solely as a source of political conflict, regionalism should also be understood as an expression of legitimate democratic aspirations for representation, equitable development, and effective governance.

The constitutional transformation of 2019 marked a watershed in the constitutional and administrative history of Jammu and Kashmir. The reorganization of the erstwhile State and the restructuring of its governance framework have significantly altered Centre–Union Territory relations, institutional arrangements, and democratic processes. While these reforms aim to strengthen national integration, administrative efficiency, and the uniform application of constitutional provisions, they have also generated important debates concerning federalism, democratic participation, political representation, and regional identity.

The study demonstrates that the long-term success of constitutional reforms depends not only on legal and administrative restructuring but also on the strengthening of democratic institutions, inclusive governance, equitable regional development, and sustained public participation. Addressing regional disparities through responsive policymaking and participatory governance is essential for fostering political stability and public confidence.

In conclusion, the future of Jammu and Kashmir lies in balancing constitutional integration with democratic inclusion. A governance framework that combines the principles of constitutionalism, cooperative federalism, transparency, and social justice can accommodate regional aspirations while reinforcing India's democratic values. Such an approach will contribute to sustainable peace, balanced development, and a resilient democratic order in Jammu and Kashmir.

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
